Coxswains Corner

Buoy – Oh – Buoy!

Whether you're running up the Blackwater River, Cruising the bay down to Skull Island, or plying the Intercoastal headed West to The Florabama or East to Crab Island, understanding the Aids to Navigation is essential. It'll keep you in the channel, with plenty of water, away from hazards, and in the proper flow of vessels.

The pamphlet to the right comes courtesy of the National Safe Boating Council. I've got a bunch of these types of infographics and we'll have them available at Pyrate meetings and other events. Here's a few additional tips to remember:

That whole Red – Right – Returning thing doesn't always work if you're in the Intercoastal Waterway (ICW). Keep red on the right only when headed Westbound in the ICW, red is on the left when Eastbound. If you happen to be on the Atlantic ICW – red is on the right only when headed South.

Carry a good spotlight! The day beacons (channel markers) aren't visible at night unless you shine a bright light on them.

Pay attention to the condition of the day markers. If one side of the marker is missing, make a note and report it to the Coast Guard. A day marker missing one side is invisible at night with even the best spotlight.

highway-designating the safest navigable channel and marking any hazards on the water.

Remember, what you see depends on where you boat—whether inland or offshore. If you are traveling to an unfamiliar area, always review nautical charts for safe navigation. These will note buoys and markers in the area.

COMMON TERMS

BUOY-Floats on top of the water and moored to the bottom; shape (cylinder or triangular), color, and numbering is important

DAYBOARD/DAYMARKER-Informational signs

BEACON-Permanently fixed, such as pole, lighthouse, or another structure, often with reflective tape or light

CHANNEL MARKER-A buoy or beacon that marks a channel

WHAT'S THE COLOR MEAN?

RED AND GREEN Mark the best channel; like road lanes, DAYBEACON DAYBEACON stay between these markers and keep to the right. Navigation Tips: Red are even-numbered, green are LIGHT odd-numbered Number on the buoy will decrease as you head further out in open water, and increase as you head toward shore CAN BUOY NUN BUCY Remember the phrase, "Red, Right," Returning* Olf returning to land, keep the red buoy on your right (starboard)

If heading out to open water, keep the green buoy on your right (starboard)
